Most of us remember past Lents as times for Olympian feats of self denial; giving up sweets and other favorite foods or other such grim activities. The liturgical reforms of Vatican II and especially the restoration of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) have helped us to relearn the connection of Lent to the gracious gift of God we received in baptism. Lent is about gracious gift not grim endurance. The gift of God's life is mediated through

God's good creation. In baptism, we are bathed in Earth's waters, anointed with the fruit of Earth's olives and fragrant perfumes, clothed in a garment of Earth's fabrics, receive a candle blazing with Earth's fire. And in baptism we are embraced by the community of the Church and commit ourselves to join with these people to be the instruments of God's

peace and justice on Earth. Baptism commits us to what Pope Francis calls "integral ecology" – a way of life that promotes all of Earth's creatures.

The Sisters of Charity Federation has recently established a *Laudato Si'* Committee whose mission is to:

- 1) promote study and on-line conversations to deepen our commitments to *Laudato Si'*;
- 2) choose topics and coordinate calls among Sisters and Associates;
- 3) form a sub-committee that will collect data on current carbon footprints at our facilities and promote assessment of carbon footprints in places where they are not yet determined.



Our Continuing Series on the UN Sustainable Development Goals...

Sustainable consumption and production is about promoting resource and energy efficiency, sustainable infrastructure, and providing access to basic services, green and decent jobs and a better quality of life for all. Sustainable consumption and production aims at “doing more and better with less.” It involves engaging consumers through awareness-raising and education on sustainable consumption and lifestyles.



FACT Each year, an estimated one third of all food produced, equivalent to 1.3 billion tons worth around \$1 trillion – ends up rotting in the garbage cans of consumers and retailers.



Monitor what you throw away every week. If you throw away half a loaf of bread, freeze half a loaf when you buy it to keep it fresh.

FACT

Less than 3 per cent of the world’s water is fresh (drinkable), of which 2.5 per cent is frozen in the Antarctica, Arctic and glaciers.



Check all faucets, pipes and toilets for leaks. Install water saving showerheads and ultra-low-flush toilets. Take shorter showers. Never use your toilet as a wastebasket. Turn off the water while brushing your teeth or shaving

FACT

Many home cleaning products are expensive and toxic.



Do some research on healthy and cheap alternatives, e.g. white vinegar and baking soda are excellent cleaners for tubs, sinks, showers, toilets.
