### Sisters of Charity "Vincentian Day" Sparks Zeal to Serve Those in Need


Students from eight schools and a University gathered for Vincentian Day at the Motherhouse of the Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth in Convent Station, N.J. on Sept. 27, the feast of Saint Vincent de Paul, to engage in hands-on ministry to serve the poor, and to honor the saint whose vision continues to inspire others to a life of charity.

General Superior Maureen Shaughnessy, SC, welcomed the 400 participants to Holy Family Chapel to begin the day with prayer. Sister Maureen reminded the students they are a vital part of over two million people worldwide in the Vincentian Family who serve the poor, marginalized, hungry and homeless. That Family consists of 160 branches of religious communities, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul chapters, and Ladies of Charity.

"St. Vincent's life taught us to be people of service," said Sister Maureen. She quoted Saint Vincent who said, "Go to the poor and you will find God."

Taking up posts in various meeting rooms, students prepared breakfast bags and sandwiches for soup kitchens, tucked school supplies in backpacks for children in need, assembled "no-sew"

blankets for distribution to people in shelters, turned donated tee shirts into shopping bags, and filled backpack "Sam Bags" with personal items for people experiencing homelessness. Sisters of Charity and Seton Associates helped to organize the ministry stations and guide the students in their efforts.

Mattson Palmer saw it "as a chance to help the unfortunate," and Brandon Sommer added "this day helps to give back to our community, to those in need." John McCabe said ministry is "living the Gospel, particularly St. Matthew." He added "I'm an altar server so charity is definitely a part of my life." Oscar Cuzzocrea credits Vincentian Day as "an opportunity to live our faith." Oscar finds inspiration in the New Testament and said his

favorite Gospel story is The Prodigal Son. "God gives everyone a second chance," he said, "and that Gospel has been helpful to me all my life."

Seventh graders at Assumption School in Morristown Emma Potian and Logan Sodono agreed that ministry "is a real nice thing to do," while Olivia Minoia said, "helping out makes you feel good," and Emma Mainardi added "helping the poor is more important than anything I've done all day."

Senior Chyann Gaynor of Saint Vincent Academy in Newark said "it's important to give back. What you take for granted at home sometimes are things others just don't have in their homes – like this blanket I am making." Saint Vincent Academy Junior Britney Edionseri said she made blankets last Thanksgiving as a community service project. "We gave the blankets to children in the hospital and the kids loved them. It's nice to be here to make blankets again."

Javon Barron, an eighth grader at Saint Joseph School in Jersey City said he liked learning more about Saint Vincent. Javon helped others place needed school supplies in backpacks for students without them. He said, "Instead of doing things for myself, it is better to be helping people in need." Classmate Bryan Ndiaye agreed. "There are kids who cannot afford all these school supplies. Helping them makes me feel better and less selfish."

Kristine Keliher, another eighth grader at Saint Joseph School, said, "I feel bad there are kids who can't get school supplies. I am happy to help. "Classmate Ariana Larin saw her ministry as a way of life. She said, "By helping someone, you're following a good path. I plan to stay on it."

Sylvia Onserio and Anyia Ahmad of Sacred Heart School, Jersey City helped fill bags with breakfast items for a local soup kitchen. Each bag contained a fruit cup, cereal box, granola bar, juice and milk. Sylvia said, "There are lots of hungry people. I hope they like the food in the bags." Anyia said, "I felt really

happy to put that food in the bags for people who don't have much. I would like to continue to do this." Anyia thought she might continue a food ministry at her school.

Students at Saint Elizabeth University made 500 sandwiches for area soup kitchens, and students at the Academy of Saint Elizabeth made blankets for people in homeless shelters.

Father Terence Moran, director of Peace, Justice and Ecological Spirituality for the congregation, led a session on political activism for women of Josephine's Place, a ministry in Elizabeth that serves immigrant women.

Participants represented Saint Elizabeth University and the Academy of Saint Elizabeth in Convent Station, Saint Vincent Academy of Newark, Mother Seton Regional High School of Clark, De Paul High School of Wayne, Sacred Heart Elementary School and Saint Joseph Elementary School of Jersey City, Assumption Elementary School of Morristown, Saint Vincent

Martyr Elementary School of Madison, and Josephine's Place of Elizabeth, all in New Jersey.

Saint Joseph University Medical Center of Paterson, Trinitas Regional Medical Center of Elizabeth, and Maris Stella Retreat and Conference Center of Harvey Cedars contributed canned food for distribution to Catholic Charities and to St. Joseph Social Services in Elizabeth.

Sister Maryanne Tracey, SC, and Shannon Hoffman, codirectors of Vocation and Mission Engagement for the Sisters of Charity, organized Vincentian Day to foster awareness of Saint Vincent de Paul and the mission of the Sisters of Charity, and to motivate others to a lifetime attitude of generosity.

"We wanted to spread the good work of Saint Vincent through prayer and example," said Sister Maryanne. "We especially sought to set the hearts of young people on fire with a passion to stretch out their hands to lift up those in need."







# SVA Plants the Seeds of CHRISTIAN SERVICE

or more than 50 years each student of Saint Vincent Academy in Newark, N.J., has participated in Studentsin-Community, a service-learning program that shapes the girl's spirituality, planting the seeds of Christian service and helping her to appreciate the importance of her commitment to the multiple communities in which she lives. In 2022 only the seniors were able to go out to community agencies to provide service. Having returned to school as the COVID restrictions were lifting, students from the ninth, 10th and 11th grades worked together in cross-graded groups to provide activities and funds to support One World, One Love. That non-profit organization provides refugees and asylumseekers with basic needs (housing, legal services, language assistance), as well as fun trips and activities for families, welcoming all they serve with love and acknowledging their clients' God-given dignity.

The SVA students developed games for limited English-proficient children, such as fishing games, cornhole, bowling and colorful flashcards for learning English words. On the second day of SIC the SVA girls were organized into crossgraded teams and "earned" funds through various field day activities and competitions. Their earnings reached \$2,000 – thanks to generous alumnae – that was donated to One World, One Love, along with the children's games.

Despite the continuing obstacles presented by the pandemic, the faculty of Saint Vincent Academy once again was able to provide a meaningful service experience for their students. The Sisters of Charity applaud the Saint Vincent community as each day it engages "current and future generations in the charism and energy of Charity." # Peace Pole Dedicated on Convent Station Campus

n Oct. 4, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, members of the three communities on our Convent Station campus, the Sisters of Charity, the Academy of Saint Elizabeth, and Saint Elizabeth University, gathered to close the Season of Creation by blessing a Peace Pole in front of Holy Family Chapel. Sister Maureen Shaughnessy, SC, General Superior of the Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth, noted in her welcome that, "a Peace Pole is an internationally recognized symbol of the hopes and dreams of the entire human family, standing vigil in silent prayer for peace on earth. Each Peace Pole bears the message May Peace Prevail on Earth in different languages. Our Peace Pole has four languages – English, Spanish, Haitian Creole, and Arabic. There are estimated over 250,000 Peace Poles in every country in the world dedicated as monuments to peace. Our

Peace Pole finds a new home here after being many years at Marylawn of the Oranges High School."

Together the participants extended their hands in blessing over the Peace Pole and prayed, "God of Peace, bless this Peace Pole, which will stand on our campus in silent vigil, a reminder of our desire to be people of peace and makers of peace. May Peace prevail on Earth."

Fr. Terrence Moran, director of the Office of Peace, Justice, and Ecological, in closing the ceremony reminded us that St. Francis of Assisi was famous for the words of greeting that he used with everyone he met – Pace e bene – Peace and All Good and invited us to turn to each other and greet each other with Francis's words: Pace e Bene.

A Sister of Charity Ecospirituality Group Retreat

en years ago, a group of Sisters of Charity, Seton Associates, and friends met to form an SC Ecospirituality Group. The group formed out of a desire to deepen our understanding of the relationship between our spiritual heritage received from St. Vincent de Paul and St. Elizabeth Ann Seton and our commitment to care of creation and sustainable living. For 10 years the group has met every month (by ZOOM since the start of COVID) and has been a great source of learning and mutual support for the members. From Oct. 28-30, the group had a new experience – a weekend retreat at Mercy Ecospirituality Center in Benson, Vt. https://mercyecology.org/.

The Center is a ministry of the Sisters of Mercy and includes an organic farm, sheep, chickens, and bees. Our time together was blessed by sunny autumn days and spectacular star-studded nights. Our farm-to-table meals were organic and delicious. We prayed the 13.8-billion-year story of the universe on a beautiful Cosmic Walk through the meadows, hills, and woods of the property. We spent time in a Native American practice called a "medicine walk" in which we listened to the land itself as a spiritual director. For Sister Roberta Feil, SC, "our retreat Mercy Ecospirituality Center instilled in me a deeper understanding of the universe as the Temple of God. All is immersed in God. There is an interdependence and relationship which connects all to all. Creation is the "Boundless Charity" of God's unfolding. We are each called to be boundless lovers of all and to respect all creation, human or otherwise. God is truly everywhere!"

The Sisters of Charity who were missioned in warmer climates wore habits adapted for the higher temperatures. In 1966, five of the sisters who taught at Saints Peter and Paul School on St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands, enjoyed a typically lovely day. From front to back they are Sister Stephanie Marie (Sister Jean Whitley), Sister John Dorothy, Sister Richard Ann, Sister Mary Angela and Sister Regina Ellen (Sister Regina Coll).

A month before entering the Sisters of Charity, 20-year-old Celia Gelinas (front in photo) of Rockland, Mass., participated in the Women's NEAAAU Indoor Track and Field Championships. Celia placed second in the senior eight-pound shot put event, winning a silver medal. As Sister Cecilia Mary, often called "Big Ceil," she never lost her love of sports, her hearty laugh or her zest for life. Beginning with second grade and moving on to high school, Sister Ceil taught in Catholic schools for 22 years, before assisting her sisters at Saint Anne Villa, providing them with chiropedic and podiatric care.

In 1865, Mother M. Xavier Mehegan petitioned the Morris and Essex Railroad Co. to stop at the entrance to our grounds, as the Madison and the Morristown train stations were three and five miles distant, respectively. Having received a favorable response, the Sisters of Charity built a simple, little station and paid the depot master's salary. In 1870 Mother Xavier requested that more trains stop at our gates including those from upstate New York for the convenience of the Academy students who lived in that area and that freight be delivered to "our own depot." In 1876 the railroad erected a new station (pictured), which it named "Convent."





## Prayer for Peace

n Sunday, June 26, nearly 200 people gathered in Holy Family Chapel in Convent Station, N.J., to pray for peace in Ukraine. It was a coming together of the Latin (Roman) and Ruthenian (Byzantine) Churches.

# Office of **FINANCIAL SERVICES**

First and foremost, the Financial Services Office has a fiduciary responsibility for acting in the best interest of the Sisters of Charity to ensure that their assets – property, cash, and investments – are safeguarded and secure. The congregation is quite different today than it was 50 years ago, when we had many more sisters in the Congregation, (approximately 1000 compared to 175 now) and therefore many more Sisters working to fund operations in support of our Mission. So, what worked in 1972 might not work today given our change in demographics.

It starts with a basic financial philosophy; many companies today have growth philosophies or increasing shareholder value philosophies. The Sisters of Charity philosophy is one of sustainability. How can we make sure that we have enough resources to continue our Mission in perpetuity?

We have incorporated a few simple principles in support of our sustainability philosophy:

**Balanced Budget:** Our operational budget or expenses must be funded with a source of revenue; in essence, that's a balanced budget. Limit your activities to driving the Mission.

Kaizen: Japanese word that translates as "good change" or

continuous, never-ending improvement. Through this process we have become more efficient and cost effective.

**Debt:** Low to zero debt. Funding debt (especially as interest rates rise) can be costly and is often an ineffective use of resources.

Because we have fewer numbers and therefore less revenue, our dependence on donations is more important than at any other time in our 163-year history. As we are an aging Congregation, it should not be surprising that most of our expenditures go toward long-term care and other health care costs. Of course, many of our other expenditures are focused on solidifying and supporting the Mission. Therefore, we believe it's our obligation to utilize all donor support in the appropriate manner for which it was intended. That is the primary focus of the Financial Services Office – to make sure dollars are utilized as promised in support of our Mission.

More specifically, the role of the CFO/COO primarily includes, but is not necessarily limited to, the following responsibilities:

1) Sustainability: Develop strategies in support of our commitment to sustainability.

- 2) Oversight: Acting in an oversight capacity for all operations.
- 3) Transparency: Act as a co-pilot to Leadership and ensure it has transparency to all critical issues.
- 4) Strategic Planning: Long-term perspective, three-to-five-years, and 30 years and beyond timeframes.


Judy has been employed here for nearly a year and assists Maria with accounts payable.






